## "Modern" Translations

NA27: <u>Luke 2:33</u> καὶ ἦν ὁ πατὴρ αὐτοῦ καὶ ἡ μήτηρ θαυμάζοντες ἐπὶ τοῖς λαλουμένοις περὶ αὐτοῦ.

NRSV - Luke 2:33 And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him.

NAS95 -- Luke 2:33 And His father and mother were amazed at the things which were being said about Him.

ESV -- Luke 2:33 And his father and his mother marveled at what was said about him.

NJB -- Luke 2:33 As the child's father and mother were wondering at the things that were being said about him,

NIV -- Luke 2:33 The child's father and mother marveled at what was said about him.

VULG -- Luke 2:33 et erat pater eius et mater mirantes super his quae dicebantur de illo

#### This reading is supported by the earliest and best preserved manuscripts, including:

ℜ, B,D,W, Family 1, 700, 1241 -- ℜ and B both date to the mid 4th century Some Old Latin, the Vulgate, Georgian, some Syriac copies Origen, Jerome, and Augustine

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## The "Traditional" Translation

MajT: <u>Luke 2:33</u> καὶ ἦν Ιωσηφ καὶ ἡ μήτηρ αὐτου θαυμάζοντες ἐπὶ τοῖς λαλουμένοις περὶ αὐτοῦ.

KJV -- Luke 2:33 And Joseph and his mother marvelled at those things which were spoken of him.

This reading is supported by a majority of the manuscript witnesses, including:

K, X, Δ, Θ, 053, Family 13, 28, 565, 892, 1009,, 1010, 1071, 1079, 1195, 1216, 1230, 1242, 1253, 1344, 1365, 1546, 1646, 2148, 2174 -- the earliest of these mss is 9th century AD, most are after 10th century The Byzantine Lectionary contains a version of this variant, Many Old Latin copies, Some Syriac copies, some Coptic copies, the Diatessaron

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# One of the Variants of this verse as found in Manuscripts: A, $\Pi$ $\Psi$ and many other manuscripts

καὶ ἦν ὁ Ιωσηφ καὶ ἡ μήτηρ αὐτου θαυμάζοντες ἐπὶ τοῖς λαλουμένοις περὶ αὐτοῦ. "And the Joseph and the mother if him marvelled at those things which were spoken of him."
